

# Sam's Big Day Out

It all started just before Christmas with an email from our good chum and supporter Ian Dury who told us: 'A few weeks ago I was approached by a lady who was formerly an employee of Stuart Crystal. Her 10-yeard old son Sam attends St James Primary School in Wollaston and their end of year project was on local Black Country industrial Heritage. He chose Stuart Crystal and its links with the Titanic and they came to me for some background information. Last week he and his proud Mom reported back to me that Sam's tutor was so impressed he was awarded 6 points out of a normal maximum of 5. He had made a replica of the Red House Cone two feet tall and with his background written work it was regarded as outstanding. I thought this might be of interest'.

It most certainly is of interest; in promoting Stourbridge Glass for future generations part of our role must also include identifying the next generation of custodians and enthusiasts. This was just too good an opportunity to miss so we made contact with Sam and his family to work out a surprise treat especially for this talented young man.





By sheer coincidence your Editor had been invited to a current affairs discussion with broadcaster lan Marrey on Black Country Radio <u>www.blackcountryradio.co.uk</u> and as part of preparations for this the contributors are invited to suggest a topic they may like to raise. When I mentioned Sam's achievements lan jumped at the chance to speak with him 'live on air'.



And so, on the morning of Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> January 2017, and in a hi-tech studio at the station's impressive new home in Merry Hill, that was by chance choc-a-bloc with visitors, Sam, his mom Sara and dad Mike Holmes took to the airwaves. Completely unfazed by it all, Sam proved to be a natural as he described how and why he had undertaken his project and had even had a go at certain aspects of 'hands on' glasswork such as sandblasting. When he mentioned with a tinge of regret that he had never done any glassblowing I don't think I gave too much away in suggesting there was something we might be able to do to rectify this gap in his expertise.

And so, on to *White House Cone - museum of glass* where Sam and his parents, now joined by grandparents Roy Timmins and Daphne Holmes, were introduced to fellow Trustee and glassmaker Allister Malcolm and family, Trustee Meriel Harris and Secretary Lynn Boleyn MBE. Also in support were Ian Dury with his grandson Ethan and my guest Sheila Chapman. All of us followed in Allister's steps as he gave the Grand Guided Tour. Which was clearly a revelation for Sara as she used to work here in the days when it looked very different from now.



Allister then took us into his studio where he explained a few principles of glassmaking before then donning Sam in safety gear for a masterclass in how to make the stuff, with Sam very much at the helm. At last, with his dream of blowing glass fulfilled and a glass bauble to take home as a *memento*, Sam was then presented with a selection of signed books that we very much hope will encourage him to continue his studies. It was, quite simply, all absolutely brilliant and we wonder who was the more excited when Sam and his proud parents turned into bed that night after their truly memorable day.

Not surprisingly, and of course with the sanction of Sam's parents, the cameras were a-snappin' and the videos a-rollin' to record it all for posterity. #### The British Glass Biennale 2017 is now open for applications!

The British Glass Biennale is the foremost exhibition of excellence in contemporary glass by British artists, designers and craftspeople. It is the major exhibition within the International Festival of Glass and takes place in the heart of Stourbridge's historic Glass Quarter. With at least 80 major new glass works selected each year, the British Glass Biennale is one of the most significant statements of national glass talent. The emphasis is on new work demonstrating the highest level of excellence in design, creative imagination and technical skill. All work is available for purchase and attracts collectors, galleries and museums from around the world.

For the first time in its history, the Biennale will be open to UK citizens working or studying abroad celebrating the creative excellence of all British artists.
