An invitation

Consultants including Fuzzy Duck, a multi-media company based in Media City, Salford www.fuzzyduck.eu are working on the fit-out at White House Cone museum of glass and are undertaking a trial interpretation in order to gauge public opinion as to how the fully-fitted museum may eventually look. The team have taken one particular form of glass - rock crystal - and have created an interpretation around it.

All are invited to see the results and offer comments. The time and date is **Monday 20th February 10:30am - 4:00pm** and admission is free.

The trial is being undertaken during half-term with the intention of enhancing the experience for visitors at the Red House Glass Cone and appealing to families, especially the next generation of glass enthusiasts.

There's also an opportunity to be actively involved and volunteers are sought to help undertake:

- * handing out information at Red House to encourage visitors to White House
- * car parking
- * meet and greet to explain to visitors what's happening on the day.
