Glass for good; IFoG update

We are delighted to bring our readers the latest update from the Organisers of the 2017 International Festival of Glass. We have reproduced it virtually verbatim so the programme and Biennale download 'here' links are 'live'.

Welcome to the 7th International Festival of Glass. This August the historic Stourbridge Glass Quarter will again host Britain's greatest glass gathering as glass artists from around the world converge.

This year the Festival explores the theme of Glass for Good, and presents some fantastic projects showing how glass can be a positive influence in our lives. The inspirational Hot Shop Heroes programme in Tacoma, US has been supporting some of America's wounded soldiers. Project Leader Patricia Davidson is joining us to share her experience and to help launch a new programme for UK veterans.

Standing 100ft high, the 18th Century Red House Glass Cone chimney is the last of its kind in Europe. Taking place within its cathedral-like interior, multi award-winning singer, composer and sound artist Andy Garbi will be staging a site-specific audio-visual event that celebrates and explores the nature of glass.

Over 300 artists are represented in 16 inspiring exhibitions over 11 venues, including the brand new White House Cone museum of glass. Contributors range from veterans of glass making, such as Keith Cummings, and the esteemed Guild of Glass Engravers, to new emerging talent. As part of Contemporary Glass Society's 20th Anniversary, 138 members have each made a piece of glass in celebration.

We look forward to meeting you in Stourbridge to celebrate one of the most fascinating and diverse art forms around. With tons of demonstrations, lectures, workshops, taster sessions, street theatre, storytelling, narrowboat rides and family activities, join us in August for another fabulous opportunity to experience the best of British in the traditional heart of UK glassmaking.

Data Protection update

Readers may be aware from reports in the media and other outlets that the requirements under Data Protection legislation are under review. In particular, on 25th May 2018 the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) comes into force. This places requirements on compliance and revisions to the handling of personal data. Whilst this is yet some way off your Editorial team feel that in the interests of transparency this may be an appropriate juncture to reiterate our position on the storage and handling of the information about you that is contained on our database.

The British Glass Foundation database contains the briefest personal information on its supporters that is limited to nothing more than a name, relevant contact details and occasional supplementary tags, based on details supplied by the subscriber, that may be helpful; for example 'interested in volunteering', 'willing to share images', 'writer researching glass archives'. No other information is stored; information is used only for the proscribed purpose of informing BGF subscribers and details are never – *never* – shared with or divulged to a third party.

Content is reviewed regularly for currency and accuracy and such content is kept on a computer system to which only the database holder has access. Subscribers can view their entry on this database at any reasonable time and at no cost. We send out information only to those who have asked to receive it or who have expressed a *bona fide* interest in our work.

In the event of wishing to stop receiving our information, a message with *'remove'* in the subject header field to <u>bgf@britishglassfoundation.org</u> will elicit an acknowledgement by 'reply' as soon as reasonably practicable and in any case within 48 hours. Our *Privacy Statement and Policy* can be viewed in full on our website at <u>www.britishglassfoundation.org.uk/privacy/</u>

We hope this statement offers adequate reassurance that your personal details are being handled appropriately but we would, of course, welcome queries and comments via the usual address.
