#### **New mural**

A chilly evening on Friday 1st December greeted several hundred people gathered in Townsend Place in Kingswnford for the Christmas lights switch-on. Accompanied by a pig roast, singers and all the stalls and shops opening later than usual, the evening also marked my invitation to the official unveiling of an installation created by Borough Artist Steve Field. Extending for 14 panels, the history of the town is captured succinctly from its earliest days to the present. On hand to officiate and undertake the opening duties were Mayor Cllr Dave Tyler and Mayoress Barbara Tyler, together with various characters including local historian and musician John Sparry, Steve Field in person, and a surprise appearance (a surprise in so much he has been dead for this past 400 years) in the shape of Gunpowder Plot conspirator Robert Catesby who, to the untrained eye, looked suspiciously like fellow historian Adrian Durkin. I was also delighted to be introduced to members of the Kenchington family, to whom I could at last offer my personal condolences for the recent loss of Charles Kenchington. There are so many loose threads at play here, I think it may be helpful if I draw them together with a small narrative ...



Older residents of Kingswinford may recall the big house and Doctor's surgery that once stood on the corner diagonally opposite from The Cross and was the family home of the Kenchingtons. In the early 1960s the house was demolished and the current precinct took its place. Charles Kenchington, who lived here for a time, was a philanthropist with many passions whom I first met some years ago through our mutual association with the River Severn. He was also interested in glass, so no surprise meeting him again through the British Glass Foundation, to whom he was a supporter and benefactor. What did surprise me was to learn of ye wider family's deep and lengthy associations with the Chance company in its heyday; Charles's niece Heidi Colley (nee Kenchington), who now manages Townsend Place, is the granddaughter of Tom Sharp, who was a manager of Chance Brothers in Spon Lane and Malvern Link from 1947 to 1980. Chance Glass Works Heritage Trust is, of course, our sister organisation.

There is one final connection that links us tangentially with this venture and will doubt less ally the glass world in perpetuity with the Kenchington family: Steve Field produced the artwork using a form of print onto metal that is sealed against the elements by being vitreous enamelled with ... a firing of powdered glass!

The 'walk of history' is on show at Townsend Place in the passageway between the precinct and the car park. It is viewable during usual opening hours and is specially illuminated during darkness.
