We are delighted to learn that our colleague and supporter (and personal friend - Ed) Dr Malcolm Dick has been recognised in the 2019 New Year's Honours list with the award of an OBE for his services to the history of the West Midlands. In addition to his role at Birmingham University's history centre Malcolm is a Trustee of the Black Country Living Museum. His considerable list of credits also involves associations with West Midlands History www.historywm.com and the creation of Revolutionary Players www.revolutionaryplayers.org.uk - the list goes on.

Malcolm told the local media: 'I am surprised but very honoured to receive this award. In particular it recognizes the importance of local and regional history and also the work that universities can do by linking with museums and other groups.'



Our heartiest congratulations to a thoroughly unassuming yet inspirational man whose lifetime of dedication to the region's history has been justly acknowledged.

Legends of glass - an occasional series

As has been reported on in GCs *passim*, our friend and colleague Ian Dury is compiling a collection of recordings to remember key people associated with the glass industry. He tells us that he recently had the great pleasure of speaking with the distinguished **Fred Bridges** on a rare visit to Stourbridge.

Fred, now in his 90s but physically active and resident in Somerset, was accompanied by his son Richard and Daughter Mary as he revisited the Red House Glass Cone, meeting up with old friends and colleges and reminiscing of times past.



Employed by Dudley College he started up a Glass Department and established the Glass College in Brierley Hill that was officially opened in 1973 by HRH Duchess of Kent. Fred was assisted by two master craftsmen; glassmaker Colin Gill and glasscutter John Davies. It was recognised that there was a need for apprentices from local crystal companies to attend college on a day release to develop glassmaking and decorating skills and to gain City & Guilds qualifications.

Fred retired in 1988 at the time when the number of apprentices was in decline and there was an imperative for the College to diversify; hence the International Glass Centre was established. Many of today's established contemporary glassmakers trained at the centre and the centre built a worldwide reputation for glassmaking excellence.

Fred was invited up to Stourbridge to make an oral recording of his contribution to the Stourbridge glass industry that he was so passionate about. The recording will be a part of the *Voices from the Cones* project, which has been established to record the stories from the many craftsmen and women from across all sectors of the Stourbridge glass industry.

These will ultimately be deposited at the Dudley Archives for future generations to use for research and educational purposes in helping to interpret the heritage of a great industry that became respected around the world.

News from the borderlands

The castle in Hay-on-Wye just inside the Powys border and about 4 miles down the road from me is a grand affair that dominates the town. Constructed in consequence of the Norman invasion of Wales, there is a medieval fortification and 17th Century Mansion House. Seriously damaged by fires, it has since 2011 been owned by the Hay Castle Trust who plan to renovate it as an arts and education centre. It is currently undergoing renovation so is attracting much interest and I recently came across an intriguing bit of information for glass aficionados in the January 2019 edition of our *Wye Local* magazine www.wyelocal.co.uk that I reproduce here verbatim with kind permission of the Editor.

In the last month Peter (Peter Doring, archaeologist - GF) has excavated inside the medieval tower where there was once a Victorian era brick-vaulted wine cellar. Peter found seven perfectly intact and beautiful green wine bottles which had been hidden behind the brickwork. It almost appears that someone had been helping themselves to the wine and then concealing the evidence. Maybe the culprit was a butler who worked for Lady Glanusk when she lived in the castle? Another intriguing discovery was a number of highly decorative glasswork. Initial research suggests that they are Venetian glass from the 15th or 16th century. They are incredibly delicate with intricate and highly elaborate designs suggesting they were very high status wine glasses. Archaeological work will continue in the burnt out east section of the mansion and around the gate once the scaffolding is removed.
