#### 2022 is 'The Year'


We are grateful to Simon Bruntnell for drawing this to our attention ...

An organisation calling itself The International Commission of Glass (ICG) <a href="http://www.iyog2022.org">http://www.iyog2022.org</a> proposes to present to the United Nations (UN) a project to name the year 2022 as International Year of Glass. Here is a website quote from Alicia Durán Carrera, President of the ICG: "The idea is to tell the whole world about the world of glass. Each sector will be covered and the objective is to have a high impact on the global community".

The initiative claims to already have the support of major organisations including Corning Museum of Glass <a href="https://www.cmog.org">https://www.cmog.org</a> and a report to be presented to the UN in February 2020 will describe the importance of glass as a transformer material in the history of humanity, its role in a sustainable society and an emphasis that we are in the era of glass. BGF has expressed an interest to learn more about this initiative and we will report as appropriate.

#### Blast from the past



#### New book

At this very moment I have in front of me a simply sumptuous new book entitled *The Black Country;* a history in 100 objects. The title speaks for itself and although the eclectic contributions range from a narrowboat lamp to an enamelled tea kettle and all points in between there is, of course, a sizeable input on glass. And who should be a key contributor but BGF Trustee James Measell who can claim three items therein, namely the 1876 Portland Vase, a vase by Carder/Hodgetts, and a painting of a glasshouse interior. Then there are other 'glassy' articles dealing with people, objects and events that move James to comment: 'It's a great read throughout, even if I do say so myself!'
