

• As a practising glass artiste Allister has his own professional website and social media feeds but in his capacity as a Trustee of BGF he also independently manages, monitors and contributes to the White House Cone Facebook stream. This is more usually populated by matters connected with our own operations but in the circumstances BGF issued a press release via its usual channels to extend its support to the wider glass industry in welcoming contributions from anyone wishing to share news, promote their work or maintain contact with colleagues. Note: this facility will remain open post-Covid for a period to be reviewed.

Dr Audrey Whitty is Head of Collections and Learning (Deputy Director), National Museum of Ireland with considerable practical experience including a spell working at Corning Museum of Glass, New York. Cyberspace saves the day

Deep into lockdown back in early May I received an intriguing email from collector and specialist Mark Holford who said: 'I have been asked by the Glass Art Society (America's main artist body) to give a lecture on my collection to form part of their virtual annual conference. Their live conference, which was to be in Sweden, has of course been cancelled. It is slightly different from the previous version that I gave to the Contemporary Glass Society as it focuses a little more on my role as a collector. It will be recorded before a small invited audience. I have also asked five artists who have been important in my collecting career to take part: Richard Jackson & Sally Fawkes, Philip Baldwin & Monica Guggisberg, Katharine Coleman, Colin Reid and David Reekie. Would you like to be a member of the audience?'

Mark and I worked alongside each other back in 2015 when I sat under his Chairmanship on the International Festival of Glass Biennale judging panel so I was delighted to accept.

Thus it was that at 6pm on the evening of Thursday 7th May I was sat in front of my computer screen as part of a 'virtual lecture' that was as fascinating as it was novel. Sitting at ease in his home against a backdrop of shelving housing part of his extensive collection, Mark regaled us with tales of his compilation whilst alongside he showed images of individual pieces. The magic of it all was that the makers were in his audience and were invited to describe what they had made. The hour or so we were all in mutual communication simply fled by and I am sure I was not alone in wanting more. The session concluded with an open floor for comments and I was pleased to express support on behalf of BGF.

There will be few good things that will come out of Covid-19 but this is one of them. I have seen the writing on the wall and the upsurge in streamed presentations such as this is up there writ in big letters. My congratulations to Mark and his team in pulling together a superb initiative and my thanks for the invitation to be part of it.
