In memoriam

We are greatly saddened to learn of the death of Fred Bridges, who passed away peacefully in Somerset in the early hours of Thursday 28th January, just a few days shy of his 96th birthday.

After a lifetime in the Stourbridge glass industry Fred's tendrils spread deep into the past and there are countless glass *artistes* out there, some of them now household names, who owe much to Fred both in his time as a practitioner and in his later years as an instructor at the Glass Centre. A local lad and 'one o' we' by extraction, Fred continued to live in our area even after his dear wife Thelma died in 2014. Son Richard informs us how Fred regularly walked around Ridge Wood and remained fiercely self-sufficient until well past 90 when age began to take its toll, necessitating a move southward to be nearer his family.



Richard has offered us a few words, which *per* se are a charming and fitting epitaph to the man: 'Obviously it is a sad event, because it is the end of a long and well filled life. But I don't think he had any real regrets, and I have only many, many happy memories. All who met him seemed to be charmed by him, and he leaves only friends behind.'

Fred's funeral will take place in Somerset on 16th February at 1:30. Attendance will, of course, be restricted due to the covid pandemic so proceedings are being streamed live, for which Richard will offer a link in due course. In view of Fred's provenance within the glass world Richard has graciously suggested donations to the new White House Cone museum would be appropriate, for which many thanks from all at BGF.

Our sincere condolences to Richard and family and friends, together with all those who knew or who were touched by this gifted man of glass. Fred Bridges, glassman and teacher 1925 - 2021. R.I.P.
