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WE DID IT!

a special post-Grand Opening edition

Yes, indeed we did. The 'soft' opening of the new Stourbridge Glass Museum (the 'official' opening will be in September this year) was scheduled over three days; Thursday 7th April as the VIP launch, Friday 8th for exhibitor's previews and Saturday 9th opening to the general public.

Here is a synopsis of all three from some of those who were there ...

Thursday 7th April. The VIP launch

The successful completion of any task of significance is inevitably accompanied by various emotions ranging from exhilaration to relief. Thus on the evening of Thursday 7th April, when around 150 of the Great and the Good converged on Wordsley for the VIP opening of the new Stourbridge Glass Museum, the heady mix of elation, satisfaction and pride was almost palpable.

The evening was principally to thank our main funders, sponsors and supporters. Surrounded by glass items of exquisite beauty emanating from our area and beyond, all tastefully curated and displayed in state of the art cabinets, interactives and interpretations, it was challenging to reconcile that not so long ago this was an abandoned vandalised ruin of a former glassworks. After the best part of 13 years of vision, perseverance and sheer bloody-minded determination the British Glass Foundation, together with its partners, had transformed that eyesore into a world class facility. And this was their night.



The evening commenced with a glassmaking demonstration by resident *artiste* Allister Malcolm in his Hot Studio. Packed to the rafters, natch. Others took turns to dip in and out of the live experience to mingle amongst the guests and share the rarefied artistry of glass exhibits of the highest calibre. Here in action was *ars gratia artis* in its purest form; intellectualism without affectation, genius without pretence, truly a 'People's Museum' in which the magnificence of its content is counterbalanced by its accessibility to all. Then to the formal greeting and speeches hosted by Will Farmer, he of BBC's Antiques Roadshow fame but also a stalwart supporter and a Trustee of BGF. After the customary thanks to all of our sponsors and supporters, with compelling eloquence he explained the significance of Stourbridge Glass and why it merited this new home before handing over to BGF Chairman Graham Knowles.



Modestly deflecting the paeons of praised already bestowed on him Graham was at pains to draw attention to all of those without whom none of this would have been possible. He in turn handed over to Mike Wood MP (Dudley South), in whose constituency the new museum falls. As he told of his delight to be associated with the museum his passion and sincerity need no corroboration; he was genuinely moved by all he saw and was clearly delighted to be its Parliamentary representative.



The speeches concluded with a surprise presentation to Graham by BGF Ambassador Viv Astling of a delightful cameo piece specially made by Helen Millard. As Will Farmer remarked; 'We have on display here some of the oldest examples of glass so it is only fitting that the man spearheading the new museum should be presented with one of its newest'. Quite right Sir, quite right'.



This was to thank the Stourbridge Glass Museum team of Volunteers who had been specially invited to the event by Donna Owen, Volunteer Co-Ordinator, and also to promote the launch of our inaugural temporary exhibition by Vanessa Cutler '*Journeys and Horizons*' which runs until 10th July 2022.





Journeys and Horizons: 'Each work requires a journey, whether at the beginning or through to the end process of making. Developed in a year of turbulence, the work explores new horizons, and new approaches in techniques'. For the past 20 years exploring industrial archaeology in her glassmaking, Vanessa Cutler's body of new work employs both digital technology and traditional casting processes. 
So that's it ...
