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# **Auction action**

The story so far, in case you have just returned from a visit to Mars and may have missed it. Back in August 2012, Allister Malcolm and Elliot Walker bring out the big guns from their contacts book and, aided by some of the top names in the *Wonderful World of Glass* <sup>(© GF)</sup> went head to head in a glassblowing challenge as part of the International Festival of Glass celebrations. The end result was a shed-load of exquisite top notch, one-off pieces that Will Farmer and colleagues over at Fieldings Auctioneers at Stourbridge offered to auction on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> October to raise funds for the British Glass Foundation.

OK, let's now cut straight to the chase. Immediately following the auction and before leaving the site our BGF Trustee and Lady-On-The-Spot Meriel Harris sent out news that the total raised up to that point had reached a whopping £9,830, to add to that already collected during the weekend of the challenge.

To achieve an improved final figure, Will kept back a further seven lots for the next appropriate glass auction, on top of which Meriel informs us that she was approached by a gentlemen in possession of a piece that doesn't fit in with his own collection and which he is willing to pass to BGF for inclusion in this next mini-auction.

This is a simply sensational achievement by Allister, Elliot and their compatriots, full details of which are in the associated commemorative brochure described in *GlassCuts 20*. The British Glass Foundation is honoured to be the recipient of such largesse and offers its sincere thanks to everyone who gave their time and effort towards this wonderful attainment. Quite apart from the substantial amount of funds raised, this is yet a further unassailable demonstration of the energy, commitment and passion generated by Stourbridge Glass and its exponents; both of which are the finest in the world. A feature in the *Express & Star* on Monday 29<sup>th</sup> October concerning developments at the White House site, the proposed home for the new Glass Museum, has elicited this comment from BGF Chairman Graham Knowles:


'We wish to clarify that we remain loyal to our initial aims and objectives (see BGF website for details - Ed) and recognize the frustration created by the delays that are taking place. We are supporting all viable initiatives that bring the enhanced museum a step closer. We are still in discussions with both the Council and the site developer and it would now appear that the most mutually favourable route is to form a charitable trust to actively take control of the collections, with an option on the future building also. This would incorporate educational projects and become a facility that would be sustainable and successful in the long term. We are most grateful for the support of the local glass industry and regret that the pace at which we would all like to advance is determined by factors beyond our control. This is a long term process; BGF remains committed to the long term.'

Further meetings *inter alia* are scheduled; *GlassCuts* will, as always, aim to be the first to bring you the news.
