An Honourable lady



On behalf of BGF and SGM we are truly delighted to offer our heartiest congratulations to our colleague and supporter Barbara Beadman who has been awarded an MBE for her services to the Glass Industry in the first New Year's Honours list of King Charles III.

Many of us around this neck of the woods will know Barbara and husband Richard from their days at the helm of Plowden and Thompson Glassworks in the canalside 'New Dial' factory at Audnam, and for her tenure of over twenty years as Chair of Friends of Broadfield House Glass Museum.

With an under-stated erudition that includes a lengthy set of post-nominals, now of course including 'MBE', Barbara's achievements include re-introducing the teaching of glass beadmaking into the UK in the 1990s for which she is a Founder Honorary member of Glass Beadmakers UK. She has also served as Glass Industry representative on the West Midlands Regional Development Board and is currently a Board Member of The British Glass Manufacturers Confederation.

As if that wasn't enough to be going on with, she is also immediate Past Master of the Worshipful Company of Glass Sellers of London and yet still finds time to support educational and charitable causes. Originating from Preston, we are rather fortunate that Barbara and Richard chose to relocate to Stourbridge many years ago so we can rightly claim her as 'one o' we'. We asked her for a quote on her award and, with characteristic understatement, she told us simply: 'I am delighted.'

There is not the slightest suggestion that Barbara will use her Royal accolade as a bed of laurels on which to rest and we have no doubt she will continue her considerable contribution to the glass industry and beyond for a long time to come. In the meantime we raise a glass to the splendid, and well-deserved, recognition of Barbara Beadman MBE.

New works by Georgia Redpath explore the possibilities of this common language of pattern. Rather than attempting to recreate the world around us, she uses a limited palette of geometric building blocks to craft her own sculptural world. The resulting forms are natural, architectural and a joyful union of the two. An evening event with drinks available to purchase. Doors open at 6pm, artist talk begins at 7.00 p.m. followed by Q & A session.

Call for entries

The Guild of Glass Engravers is seeking entries for the second *Make Your Mark* exhibition and have extended their submission date to 28th February 2023 with the exhibition planned for end-March.

Part of the proceedings will involve the award of the David Peace Prize. This is a bequest from the estate of founding member of the Guild of Glass Engravers, the late Dr David Peace MBE, and a bursary from his family. David, past Chairman and President of the Guild, was noted for his lettering on glass. He believed in encouraging young talent, not only in the field of lettering, but also figurative and abstract artists. The prize will be awarded to the student whose entry shows the greatest talent and originality in the use of engraving on glass. The first prize will be of £500, the second prize £200 and both prizes include free student membership of The Guild of Glass Engravers for one year.


Headlong into cyberspace

Glance at Chance



Chance Brothers & Co Ltd was at one time the greatest glassmaker in the world, and one of Smethwick's foremost employers, providing the glass for the Crystal Palace, the Palace of Westminster and more than half the lighthouse lenses worldwide. It was particularly known for the way its workers were cared for, and for the philanthropy of the firm and the directors.

Henry Chance is the grandson of Sir Hugh Chance, the last family chairman of the firm. He is descended from the two brothers who gave their name to the company, and is Vice-Chairman of the Chance Heritage Trust which aspires to regenerate the now-derelict former glassworks. Henry is presenting A brief history of Chance Brothers, with a review of the work of the Chance Heritage Trust at the end of the talk.
