Invitation to the Opening Reception of the Carnival Glass Society's 40th Anniversary Exhibition at Stourbridge Glass Museum, 1800hrs Saturday 22nd April 2023

celebrating the Beauty, Creativity and Ingenuity of pressed iridised glass

The exhibition runs from 8th April to 5th November 2023 showing around 300 items of iridescent pressed glass including rarities

not often seen. Please join us for a reception on 22nd April where we travel on a journey that starts by looking at the inspirations for carnival glass and the early years after its introduction in America in 1907, through its spread across the world in the 1920s and 1930s as glassmakers in Europe, Australia, India and South America started making pressed iridised glass with their own unique designs and styles. The exhibition also shows later carnival glass made in the second part of the 20th Century, when the interest of collectors spawned a revival, and beyond.

Underpinning the exhibition is a 'Stourbridge Glass Success Story' as it looks at how the pioneers from this area helped spark a craze for carnival glass which spread the legacy of Stourbridge's glass making creativity and expertise worldwide. After a welcome drink and chance to browse the museum, the Carnival Glass Society Team will give a talk in the exhibition area, providing you with an insight into the exhibition, and take you on a tour of the exhibits, telling you some of the intriguing stories behind them. So do please join us as we would love to see you there.

Made In Stourbridge; the story of The 2012 Portland Vase Project is the latest instalment in the extraordinary on-going tale of the 2012 Portland Vase, a replica of the original iconic Roman version, that was created in Stourbridge by a team of contemporary glass artisans.

A project devised by Ian Dury and chronicled by Graham Fisher MBE FRGS

Lifelong glass-man and Project Coordinator Ian Dury wanted to demonstrate that the glassmakers of Stourbridge still possessed the inherent skills and talents that are a prerequisite in reproducing one of the most enigmatic pieces of ancient glass ever produced. His efforts to recreate not only the vase but also several other 'mini-masterpieces' including the Auldjo Jug, caused a sensation on their launch in 2012, with a proud Ian promising they would be housed in the new Stourbridge Glass museum as a testament to the area's rich heritage and its promising future.

That moment has arrived; the new museum is now open and the 2012 Portland Vase is on display. *Made In Stourbridge* has been jointly created by Yours Truly and Mary Spence MBE of Sparrow Publishing (declaration of interest - who happens to be my 'other half') both working probono, and with Ian Dury kindly funding printing costs.

The result is a pocket-sized commemorative brochure explaining the significance of the vase to visitors and identifying its place within the global world of glass. It is available at nominal cost from the museum with all proceeds to British Glass Foundation. Those wishing to learn more can also read *The 2012 Portland Vase; Replication of a Masterpiece*, the full authorised biography by the same author and publisher, which is also available from the museum and again with proceeds to BGF.

In celebration of the book launch, an exhibition will simultaneously be launched at Blowfish Glass UK, in the hybrid gallery and hot glass studio founded by Bethany Wood and Elliot Walker.

The event will also feature:

- Book signing by author Catherine Dunstan.
- Live Demonstrations in Hot, Stained, Kiln-Formed Glass and Glass Painting by the exhibiting artists.
- First access to the PROCESS and fringe exhibition DRIVEN, with an opportunity to meet the artists.

It will open all day from 10:30am, with speeches and drinks at 6:00pm.

The launch is on Saturday 25th March, and the exhibitions will run through to Saturday 15th April. Entry is free, and no ticket is required.
