The Contemporary Glass Society has announced the launch of the 2023 Graduate Prize and New Graduate Review. Quoting their latest press release: 'We are delighted that once again the Worshipful Company of Glass Sellers of London Charity Fund has supported the Prize and Review together with Professor Michael Barnes MC FRCP and our other sponsors, Creative Glass, Pearsons Glass, Warm Glass and Neues Glas - New Glass: Art & Architecture'.

As students emerge from their education, CGS and the Glass Sellers' aim to support graduates at the beginning of their journey towards a long career in glass making. The Graduate Review offers graduates the chance to promote their work to a worldwide audience and many previous winners have gone on to establish themselves as professional makers. There will be a Winner, 2nd Prize plus two Runners-up prizes, along with several Commendations. All will appear in the CGS – New Graduate Review 2023. Spring Rituals II - 'Fresh Eggs' is the latest exhibition courtesy of Stephen and Kate, a.k.a Gillies Jones who create sumptuous glass up in the delightful Dales of North Yorkshire. "This new collection, principally inspired by the eggs of the now extinct Elephant bird, includes engraved forms in both transparent and opaque blown glass. The forms portray the function of the egg as a protector of new life and its inherent fragility. The fragmented patterns are universal in their structure, like cracked dry earth or breaking ice sheets'.

* Glass enthusiast Richard Close is seeking some advice. He tells us:



'I have a piece of pressed commemorative glass of about 4 inches, possibly a cup-plate, of young Victoria (possibly 1837 Coronation) looking like the 1836 painting by F Winterhalter but in reverse direction. I have consulted Raymond Slack's standard book on English Pressed Glass (1830 to 1900) and the earliest completely pressed piece he illustrates is the Death of Albert in 1861. I can find no other young Victoria pressed glass piece in any illustration, so I am curious if this might be one of the earliest English pieces around?'

A fascinating line of enquiry most likely attracting the attentions of our pressed glass enthusiasts; any pointers for Richard please?
