And there's more great news from St Helens with the official opening of the *Glass Futures Global Centre of Excellence*. This £54m venture in St Helens will soon be home to a unique experimental furnace and other technology that will pioneer ways of making carbon neutral glass.

Speaking at an event on the 6th of June Richard Katz, CEO of Glass Futures said: 'I don't let go in a hurry and a decade after the idea of Glass Futures was first conceived that dream has come to fruition. Removing carbon emissions from global manufacturing is our world's greatest challenge, and we need to change how we do things. The glass industry and the wider foundation industries (ceramics, steel, metal, chemicals, paper, and cement) need to decarbonise, to use energy sustainably and move away from natural gas as their main energy source. That's why we exist and it's thanks to the ongoing support of our founders, members, funders and supporters that we're standing here today - but this really is just the start.'

European visit proposals

The Paperweight Collectors Circle inform us they have been invited to make a trip to glass centres in Poland and Czech Republic (the former historic areas of Silesia and Bohemia) by Marek Kordasiewicz in September 2024. Marek was the curator of the first exhibition of glass paperweights in Poland at the Karkonoskie Museum in Jelenia Gora. In 2009 he opened a private glass and paperweight museum in Carlsthal-Orle, in a reconditioned building of the former glassworks grinding house. This closed in 2012, but reopened in 2017 in Szklarska Poreba (Schreiberhau) near to the Josephinenhütte (Josephine Glassworks).

The trip will start from a mutual meeting spot at Prague Airport and will take in numerous places of interest along the way, all accompanied by glorious scenery. Indications of interest for planning purposes are sought via paperweightcollectorscircle@gmail.com no later than 31st August this year; hotel, coach costs etc can then be calculated and you will be advised. Your participation would then have to be confirmed by 5th January 2024 when a £100 per person deposit will be required.
