International Festival of Glass on the move

On the morning of 3rd August, shortly after GC 226 went out, we received a press release from Janine Christley, Festival Director, which we reproduce here verbatim.

We are delighted to announce that the International Festival of Glass and the British Glass Biennale have their future secured.

Five organisations presented detailed and thoughtful proposals and we are grateful for the time and commitment they have shown. Ultimately, we had to make a choice as to which organisation could best take forward the vision of the festival, provide maximum benefit for the UK glass community and continue to work with our national and international collaborators to ensure the festival and the exhibition remains a significant global event for glass.

The successful organisation is the Glass Art Society. Brandi Clark and her team at GAS have expertise in organising complex glass events, a massive following of artists and collectors from around the world and a keen eye on the strengths and weaknesses of the current glass scene. By choosing a network it opens up possibilities for positive collaboration with UK glass centres as potential host venues. We feel this will bring the festival and the UK glass community the best possible future. 'Glass Royalty' visit



SGM Volunteer Eileen Sanders has kindly told us about a rather special visitor to these shores who took time to stop by at Wordsley recently. Here's her report:

Stourbridge Glass Museum has once again been truly honoured with very special Glass Royalty when, on Saturday 29th July, the Museum had an unexpected visit from David Smith and his charming wife Nola, visiting the UK and Ireland, from their home in Australia. David is descended from Paul Tyzack and also from the Henzey family as there were marriages between both. The name of Paul's father John, and the baptism of Paul himself on 26th April 1612, was the first recorded reference to any glassmaker in the area. David had particularly wanted to see where his ancestors were born and was on a whistle stop tour around local sites. He and Nola arrived at the Museum having just visited St Mary's Church, Kingswinford, where Paul Tyzack was baptised, and where Henzey gravestones are still visible.

It was a most enjoyable and memorable afternoon. David was pleased to know that Stourbridge Glass Museum was open, as he had only recently learned of its existence following the closure of Broadfield House. He was particularly happy to see reference to Paul Tyzack on the first floor gallery. David gave a generous donation to the Museum and left with a book detailing more of his family history. He has himself also collated information about the Tyzacks, and agreed to forward it to the Museum on his return home to Australia.

It was a most auspicious and convivial event, especially following notification from The Arts Council on Thursday 27th July, that Stourbridge Glass Museum had been awarded full accreditation, now being one of the best Museums in the UK., offering inspiration, enjoyment and learning for community and visitors. It seems all the stars are aligning, and the prestigious reputation of Stourbridge Glass Museum is spreading worldwide.

Sun, sea and glass

Lukas Hora works for Soneva Art & Glass studio, the first and only glass studio in the Maldives. He is looking for some experienced glass blowers/gaffers to join the team at Soneva.

Lukas tells us: 'The Soneva studio was founded in 2015 and provides a sustainable alternative to shipping waste glass to recycling companies. Instead, we collect used bottles from Soneva and local islands which are cleaned, crushed and melted. We use this melted glass to showcase incredible examples of 'Waste to Wealth'.

Here's where it gets intriguing: 'Every year we invite three or four artists from all parts of the world to come here for three weeks of residency. The first artist invited to our studio was Lino and after him we've been working here with Howard Ben Tre, Martin Janecky, Janusz Pozniak, Cliff Rainey, Tobias Mohl and just recently Clare Belfradge or Trine Drivsholm plus many others. On top of that we provide glass blowing experiences to our guests and also half of our production capacities are devoted to retail items and glasses for our restaurants, villas, boutique stores etc.'

* Glass (and waterways) enthusiast Nick, as mentioned above, poses this teaser: 'When clearing out recently we discovered at the back of a cupboard a box containing a cake stand. We have never used it, we cannot remember buying it, yet it mysteriously has some slight damage to the pedestal. It was made by Waltherglas, whom I assume are German. I am intrigued as to how it is made.





The upper surface is plain glass. Underneath, the surface is frosted, maybe by sandblasting, and the leaf motifs stand out when viewed from above because the glass within them is clear. At first sight I thought that the leaves were ground and polished from underneath through the frosting and into clear glass behind. However, closer examination shows that the leaf motifs actually stand clear of the surrounding glass on the underside suggesting that the piece is moulded, but how do they then do the frosting? Surely they cannot successfully 'mask-off', protecting the outstanding leaves, and blasting the remainder. I tried researching on the net, but all of the sites seem to be concerned with the sale value of the pieces, which incidentally is not much. Any advice would be welcome'.

Keep 'em coming. Our track record for solving your little difficulties is admirable. And if we can't sort it, we almost certainly know someone who can.
