



Diss will do nicely

Back in 2015 I was greatly honoured to sit on the Jury for the Biennale as part of the International Festival of Glass. Amongst others, I sat alongside a glass artist by the name of David Reekie. A more genial understated chap you couldn't wish to meet, and one who very much kept his light under a bushel. I have since learned of David's international reputation as one of the UK's leading glass sculptors and am therefore not surprised to hear that he is holding a one man show of his *objects* and drawings at the Corn Hall, Diss, Norfolk. He is quoted in a press release: *'Drawings are key to all my work; they are the beginning where I have time to think and pull together emotions and frustrations of the complex world in which we live. My drawings are very rarely seen, and this show is a great opportunity to bring together my 2D expressions with 3D finished sculptures'.*

David is also an educator, obtaining a doctorate in the arts from Wolverhampton University in 2011. He taught at Staffordshire University and the Royal College of Art and has worked and lectured internationally. <u>https://www.davidreekie.com</u>

Although David's output is seen across the world, we are advised it is very rare to see a body of work such as this in the UK. So now is your chance. Your announcement will then appear on the *Events Guide*. Allow sufficient notice and the event may be 'voiced' and broadcast live on air during daytime broadcasting. Depending on the number of events, yours might be broadcast several times; there's no guarantee but it should appear at least once. Meanwhile it stays on the *Events Guide* listings on the world-wide web until the day itself. And it's all entirely free of charge.
