




BGF's Big Day Out

We were recently invited to the World of Glass in St Helens. So off we went, and Secretary Lynn has kindly provided this report on the day.



'On Tuesday 9th January Trustees, staff and volunteers visited World of Glass in St Helens to broaden our perspectives and foster knowledge exchange. Built in 2000, The World of Glass, a registered charity, has worked hard to bring a beacon of light to the town of St Helens.



We were made very welcome with tea/coffee on arrival followed by a guided tour of the museum which included the Victorian pub, a fantastic tour of the Tank House, built in 1887 by William Windle Pilkington, and underground tunnels that brought in the gas and air that made the furnaces burn hotter and more efficiently. The Tank House is a Grade 2 listed, scheduled monument and archaeological site.

This was followed by a buffet lunch in their lovely café and then we watched a glass blowing demonstration in their hot glass studio. The Glass Gallery is an internationally important collection of glass telling the story of glass through beautiful pieces that have survived 3000 years, displayed in a jewel-like room where you can really get up close to these rare and stunning objects. A great day out which was enjoyed by everyone who visited'.

* Marilyn Gleadall, our reader from New Zealand whom we featured in this spot last time around, will no doubt be chuffed to hear of a response to her query about the unidentified glasses and jug for which she holds her breath every time she cleans them. Just a reminder that the items were given to her parents as a wedding present in 1943, and as her maternal grandparents and family, named Poole, came from Stourbridge it is a reasonable hypothesis that is where they could have been made. One of our volunteers at SGM (aren't they just ace?) namely Eileen Sanders, has come up with: 'The flower design of the enquirer's glass is similar to Stuart 'Meadowsweet Collection' although it is not exactly the same. It is not possible to see the back of the enquirer's piece as there may also be some engraving. It is possible that her design was a precursor to the later edition. Not much art glass was made during World War II as all the glass houses were commissioned by government to make items for the war effort.'

* OK, calling all Glap makers. Anyone out there? Hmmm ... it got us scratching our heads too, and it came about following a query from reader Barbara Straughn who asks: 'Hello, I am trying to confirm the meaning of these professions as seen on a Census from 1871 in Kingswinford. I know my great-grandfather was proprietor at the Glassmakers Arms in Amblecote (Stourbridge) but my Great Great Grandfather is listed as Glap maker. The neighbour's profession is listed as Glap Blower. At first I thought Glass was misspelt but then I read this description online and I wonder if you could help me with this please? 'I stated before I thought a Glap Maker was an Optician or Optical Glass-maker. This is wrong. A Glap Maker or Glapo Maker is a person who usually makes Crystal Glass Goblets with clear bowls and opaque Ruby or dark coloured stems.' (online source unknown – Ed)

To help things along, here in the shimmering opulence that is *GlassCuts Towers* we have done a bit of mooching and can find nothing in our standard works of reference, including the late David Whitehouse's authoritative dictionary of terms, so we are inclined to suggest – only a suggestion – that it may be a parochial or local term of restricted usage, possibly Stourbridge. Who knows? Perhaps you do. Put us and Barbara out of our misery via the usual address, please.
