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#### A flying start

Thank you for all your feedback following the inaugural edition of our lifestyle bulletin *OffCuts* and especially to all who dived in headlong to contribute. Our feature on the two glass vases and our new resident *artiste* Tom Southall both drew much interest and we are indebted to our readers for filling over some glaring cracks in our knowledge. In summary ...

The Elton John Vase was engraved by David Smith's son Chris. David was the designer and engraver at Webb Corbett. He taught his son the type of sand engraving technique that Terri College (resident at SGM) now uses, involving masking off with sticky back plastic tape. Around this time David also produced a cased ruby vase entitled 'A walk on Kinver Edge'. We believe Chris then left the glass industry and joined the Police. Royal Doulton published a book which featured both items. Our informant prods my memory that the talk I gave was at Wordsley Community Centre and the man who piped up 'I made it' (the Elton John case) was Malcolm Andrews, a hugely respected name in the glass trade. If the name sounds familiar then Kevin Andrews (Tom Southall's mentor, who sadly died) and Malcolm were cousins.

Both the Elephant Vase and the Elton John Vase are in the collection. The former is annotated that it was engraved by Frank Webb, the Elton John Vase bears the mark SGC.BSH 7/11/83 R.S NOO1X.





Also in the collection is a piece by Chris Smith plus several pieces that David Smith donated to the collection together with an intaglio lathe. A small but very informative booklet *Cameo Glass* by David and Chris Smith was published in 1982 by Dudley MBC (Leisure & Recreation) in a limited run of 2000. (Out of print, but available online; at the time of writing, I note there are several on sale at under a tenner - Ed).

Laura says: 'If you know a craftsperson who is committed to improving sustainability in their practice, is innovative and an inspiration for others, spread the word about the Award. We're looking for makers who've made a change to their materials or processes or innovated in another way to measurably reduce their impact on the environment within the last twelve months.

This year, the Award has been split into two prizes: 'Material Innovation' and 'Improving Processes'. Each winner will receive £1,000 and will be recognised at a Winners' Reception at the Vicar's Hall, Windsor Castle in November.'

### Opportunities in stained glass

The Worshipful Company of Glaziers and Painters of Glass has announced two awards that will provide successful applicants with work placements in stained glass studios of national or international repute.

The Lever Award 2024 provides a 30-week placement and pays a total of £11,550 (or £385 per week). There is also a training fund of £1,000. This award is open to a recent graduate, a promising trainee, or other individual interested in broadening his or her experience in stained glass, with a view to making a career in this field. It is open to those interested in becoming a stained-glass conservator or stained-glass artist. Students and practitioners from other conservation/arts disciplines are invited to apply. Applications are invited from individuals within five years of completion of their initial training in/introduction to the craft.



The Ashton Hill Award 2024 is a 15-week placement and pays a total of £5,775 (£385 per week), plus there is a training fund of £750. This award is also open to a recent graduate, a promising trainee, or other individual interested in broadening his or her experience in stained glass, with a view to making a career in this field. It is open to those interested in becoming a stained-glass conservator or stained-glass artist. Students and practitioners from other conservation/arts disciplines are invited to apply. Applications are invited from individuals within five years of completion of their initial training in/introduction to the craft.


All candidates must be resident or employed in the UK. Applicants may apply for both awards. The application deadline for both is noon on 27<sup>th</sup> March 2024, with interviews on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2024. For further details and information on how to apply, click <u>here</u>
