### Dear Visitor,

We would like you to know that the next National Glass Fair will be held at the National Motorcycle Museum in Solihull, West Midlands B92 0EJ on Sunday  $10^{th}$  November from 10.30am until 4.00pm. Admission is £5. Named as Homes and Antiques magazine's 'Fair of the Month' for November, the National Glass Fair is the original specialist glass fair attracting around 80 of the most knowledgeable and established dealers and glass artists from all parts of the UK, Europe and the United States and it is recognised that they make a point of saving their best pieces for this major event.

There will be a variety of exhibitors ranging from those selling Georgian tableware to glass artists showing their current work meaning that this is an event not to be missed. Another feature at the fair will be an exhibition of some unusual and interesting items of Hungarian glass. The exhibition will be curated by Attila Sik and Zsuzsanna Molnar and will include both older glass and contemporary pieces. You will also be able to find our popular Christmas stand in the foyer where we will be selling gifts and decorations for your tree and table.

We have received news that on Thursday 31<sup>st</sup> October this year, the National Glass Centre at the University of Sunderland welcomed their 100,000<sup>th</sup> visitor since reopening on 29<sup>th</sup> June. As if that wasn't good enough, the lucky visitor was none other than a five-year-old lad who was visiting with his family. Great to see the youngsters being encouraged into glass at the earliest opportunity.

The news release goes on to say: 'Since the Centre re-opened, following a £2.3m re-development, it has welcomed visitors from across the region and further afield, with people coming from as far away as Australia, Mexico, Canada and Malaysia. More than 85 per cent of National Glass Centre's visitors have rated the new Centre 'Excellent' to 'Good'. The Centre has received unprecedented media coverage and some fantastic accolades over the summer, including a Visit England Rose Marque, a Certificate of Excellence from Trip Advisor and was recently awarded a Special Commendation at the Sunderland Echo Portfolio Business Awards.'

James Bustard, Director of National Glass Centre said: 'Welcoming our 100,000<sup>th</sup> visitor since we opened four months ago is a landmark achievement and is testament to the support that our Centre has attracted from the region and nationally.'
