We crack off with exciting news from Victoria Scholes of the Contemporary Glass Society (CGS). She tells us:

‘Two of the UK’s top glass organizations have joined together to create a new contemporary glass showcase featuring the work of CGS members. A special display case in the lower foyer entrance at National Glass Centre will be dedicated to a year-long display of a wide variety of glass made by members of the CGS.

From Spring 2014 to Spring 2015, the work of sixteen artists will be put on show, with a total of eight showcases each displaying two CGS members’ work for a six-week period. The work will be a vibrant and varied range of sculptural, decorative and functional pieces, and they will all be available for sale.

This is not the first time these two organizations have worked together. In 2014 CGS staged a major international conference, ‘Glass Skills: Exploring the fusion of art and technique’ (Yep, we covered that - Ed) at the National Glass Centre. This new collaboration is just the beginning of a commitment by both groups to work together to bring the medium of glass to the widest audience possible.

This one is a gem and comes courtesy of a notice from our good friend Dr Malcolm Dick at the University of Brummagem. He tells us that the Midland Branch of the Newcomen Society, in collaboration with *Thinktank*, Birmingham Science Museum, is hosting a talk that promises to be an absolute blinder. Here are the details:

7:00pm, Wednesday 7th May. *Housing the Great Exhibition - The Crystal Palace of 1851* by Jim Andrew.



The Great Exhibition was in part the project of Prince Albert but was languishing in a committee. In June 1850 Joseph Paxton was asked to produce a design for the building that was to go in Hyde Park, London without excavated foundations as it was considered a temporary structure. Possibly this was the largest single constructed building in England, maybe the world, yet it was designed within a month and opened in ten months. (*That alone is amazing, and remember it was made of glass - Ed*). Doors open 6:30pm and admission is free. The Thinktank Theatre is at Millennium Point, Curzon Street, Birmingham B4 7XG.

Thanks for that, Malcolm. Have a great evening. And, with word on the street of rumours that plans are afoot for the recreation of a new ‘Crystal Palace’, this is a great opportunity to see how the original was constructed using local talent and skills. Beat that.
