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International Print Biennale 2014

In the last issue, *GC48*, we carried news of Julie Roch-Cuerrier's residency at The National Glass Centre (NGC) in Sunderland and mentioned the inclusion of her work in the forthcoming International Print Biennale (IPB) whereby she explores the potential of printing on glass. Well, there's more. The NGC is, *az eny eejut knose*, 'the UK's centre for national excellence in glass, supporting research, teaching, production, exhibition and enjoyment of contemporary glass'. Ah but, pray tell, what knoweth you about IPB? Read and learn, friends, read and learn ...

The International Print Biennale was created in 2009 as the first major project in the UK for 20 years that concentrated on the diversity of contemporary printmaking. Following the unprecedented success of the inaugural event which attracted over 95,000 visitors, the festival quickly established itself on the calendar, attracting a whopping 154,000 visitors only two years later in 2011. (*Yep. that's big - Ed*)

This years' IPB extravaganza runs from 27th June - 9th August 2014 and promises to be huge. The Print Awards are an open submission opportunity for British and international artists whose work encounters print and are the centerpiece of the event. Their colourful website, which happens to be so simple to navigate it is a joy to use, carries full details of CGS; I would like to focus here specifically on a big event they have coming up. I must declare an interest here as I am delighted to say that I have been invited to be part of it, but don't let that put you off.

The dates are 19th - 21st September 2014 and the location is the Three Swans Hotel, High Street, Market Harborough LE16 9NJ. The occasion is the CGS Annual General Meeting which also includes a market and a full social weekend. I have the flyer in front of me right now and it is a packed affair right from the informal dinner on Friday through to a visit to a local attraction on the Sunday before departure. My own involvement will be a presentation on *The Portland Vase Project and the Northwood Connection* on the Saturday afternoon; and I am most grateful to the CGS for their invitation. The Saturday evening continues with dinner and a versatile vocalist entertainer.

To attend the full weekend you need to be a CGS member. Full membership is from £14 per year, which covers up to 2 people at an email address. However if *GlassCuts* readers wish to attend just the Saturday afternoon event which covers the carnival glass sales, the Portland Vase presentation, plus a recent hard copy edition of the 36 page, full colour CGS newsletter then this is only £3 per person, which is upgradeable to full membership on the day. This option means that a couple would pay £6 on the day but, for a further £8, could then become full CGS members receiving four newsletters per year and invitations to further CGS gatherings.
