Glass Down Under



As you can see from the entry above, we occasionally carry tales of readers happening across glass facilities in out-of-the-way or unexpected places. It appears we may have started something of a trend because we have also received this thoughtful little gem from our great friend and regular contributor Mike Perkins who, when he is not gallivanting around the Antipodes, is 'yer man' at Amblecote History Society. He tells us:

My daughter lives near Christchurch on the South Island of New Zealand, and in 2010 we made the trip to see her and her family. On that occasion we hired a car and headed south on Highway 1.

We returned in 2012; this time we hired a car and did a leisurely drive around the top of the South Island. We headed west to Greymouth, and then followed Highway 6 up the west coast until we headed north-east to Nelson, from which we planned a 'day trip' to Cape Farewell, the most northerly point on the South Island.

We set off driving south-west back along Highway 6 for a few miles before turning right to go north up Highway 60. About a mile along this road we saw a brown 'tourist' sign directing us toward a Glass Studio. We turned here and found the Höglund Art Glass Studio and Gallery. On entering it was like being back home - I don't know what I was expecting, but everything seemed so familiar!

The gallery staff were very friendly (as are all New Zealanders), and we spent half an hour looking, talking and taking photos. I couldn't decide what to buy and finally settled for a Höglund T-shirt for our favourite cameo engraver. (Gimme three guesses who that is - Ed)



New Zealand is a beautiful country. Our initial trip was a couple of weeks after their first big earthquake and Christchurch was shaken but not stirred. Seeing the city on our second trip, six months after their second devastating earthquake, brought tears to my eyes. So much of the city was fenced off and many buildings missing - just acres of new car parks. It will take years to rebuild. And what will they rebuild, modern architecture or beautiful colonial style buildings? I guess we are too old to find out.
