## Award-winning new talent

Hands up if you've never heard of Harry Morgan (<u>www.harrymorgan.info</u>) from Edinburgh College of Art, because all that is about to change. Harry, you see, is this year's *Numero Uno* in the New Designers Awards. Supported and promoted by the Contemporary Glass Society, the awards (which have been featured in *GlassCuts passim* - do wake up at the back) are held every June-July at the Business Design Centre in Islington. Around 3,500 newly graduated designers come together from the top 200 design courses across the nation to meet industry employers, the media, trend predictors and a design-hungry public. There are nine design zones, covering everything from animation to architecture, graphics to glass and fashion to furniture. Judges commented: '*Harry's sculptures are visually arresting. He uses an innovative combination of materials to create tension between the fragility of glass and the solidity of the concrete and metal.*'

Other names that are likely to ping on your radar soon include the two runners up; Cara Louise Walker (<u>www.cargocollective.com/designsbycaralouise</u>) from Gray's School of Art, Robert Gordon University, Aberdeen, and Bethany Jade Wood (facebook.com/bethanyjadewood) from De Montfort University, Leicester.

#### Höglund, Johansfors and Stourbridge

The piece from Mike Perkins featuring his jaunt across New Zealand, as reported in *GlassCuts 51*, brought this follow-up from Duncan Timms at www.johansforsgallery.com

In thanking Duncan for his contribution, we are delighted to reproduce it here in full, not only because it is in itself a most illuminating piece but because it also refers warmly to 'one of our own' here in Stourbridge. Enjoy and learn, friends, enjoy and learn ...

'Höglund Art Glass has two studios, one in New Zealand and the other in Queensland. Ola Höglund was born in Stockholm in 1956 and is the son of Erik, who revolutionised the art of glass in Sweden, working from a studio in Boda glasbruk. Erik Höglund worked in Boda from 1953 till 1973 and continued as an independent artist until his death in 1998. The name Höglund became synonymous with modern Swedish glass and his colourful and fantastic creations remain collectors' items. In addition to the glass works Boda also housed Boda Smide, where Erik Höglund and Bertil Vallien developed characteristic cast-iron sculptures, Boda Nova and Boda Wood. Boda was part of the Orrefors Kosta Boda group, but the glassworks were sold in 2009 to Emmaboda kommun and are now the site of a major glass museum, the Glass Factory. In addition to hosting visiting shows the Glass Factory contains the historical collection of glass made by the Kosta, Boda and Åfors glass works, a total of about 30,000 pieces from the more-than 40 artists who have worked in the Kosta Boda Åfors concern. Marie Simberg-Höglund, the other member of the Höglund Art Glass team, was born in Göteborg and originally trained as a textile artist. Other members of the family still active in glass include his half-sister Erika Höglund who continues to live and work in Småland. Johansfors Gallery is sited 10km south of Boda, at the southern end of 'the kingdom of glass' (Glasriket). Johansfors glasbruk was also part of the Kosta Boda group, but was sold in the 1990's and has since had a succession of owners. Duncan & Liz Timms, who own and operate Johansfors Gallery, spend half the year in Småland and half in Scotland. The goal of the Gallery is to act as a centre for studio glass artists and this year's show combines items from the personal collection of Duncan and Elizabeth with pieces by Vic Bamforth, Alison Kinnaird, Nancy Sutcliffe and Adam Aaronson. Vic Bamforth, from Stourbridge, and Ola Höglund are two of the foremost practitioners of the art of painted graal.

Alison Kinnaird and Nancy Sutcliffe represent the proud tradition of engraving, something which has largely vanished in Sweden. Attempting to sell British glass in Sweden is akin to taking coals to Newcastle; the shows have generated considerable enthusiasm - but few sales!'



Hmmm ... that last sentence got us thinking - do we see a possible challenge for our local artisans on the horizon? As Lloyd Grossman might have said: *'Ladies and gentlemen of Stourbridge glass - it's over to you'*.
