This superb large platter by fellow BGF Trustee and Resident Glassmaker at *White House Cone-museum of glass* is special enough in its own right. What makes it *extra* special is that it is the first piece of glass made at the new museum, and therefore the first piece of glass made on the former Stuart site since pre-2001 when the glassworks finally closed.
