Step indside the Great Exhibition 1851



Unless you are very old (and I mean really, really old) you probably didn't get to the 1851 Exhibition. But you can change that, because at 19.00 on 14th December 2016, David de Haan is leading a guided tour of the Great Exhibition in a talk for **History West Midlands**.

'The Great Exhibition of the Works of Industry of All Nations, 1851' – to give it its full title – was held in Hyde Park that year and over 6 million people visited. That's about 1 in 3 of the entire population. When the design for the building was first published in June 1850, Punch dubbed the architectural style 'Early English Shed', but by 2nd November had been won over as the light and airy building grew, and changed the description to 'Crystal Palace'. The name stuck.

It was a temporary exhibition which ran six days a week from Thursday 1st May until Wednesday 15th October 1851. With days lost for Sundays, private views for exhibitors, plus the Opening and Closing ceremonies, the public had access on 141 days between 9am and 6pm. Queen Victoria visited 41 times!

From plans, catalogues and prints, the layout and content of the 1851 Exhibition has been reconstructed, making it possible to visit stand after stand in the order the Victorians would have seen them. Individual exhibits have been identified, foreign products marvelled at, and the whole atmosphere of the original Crystal Palace will be brought to life.

If you come to this talk you will be able to say you did visit the 1851 Exhibition after all!

Readers write

www.cgwht.org is proving to be pure rolled gold and here is another 24-carat example we recently received via our contact form. It's from Black Country ex-pat Mr Ruff, now resident a long way from these shores. He tells us ...

Attached are some images that I took in August, 2016 in Spencer's Island, Nova Scotia, Canada. They are of the present lighthouse (often called the 'pepper pot' design which is common in smaller lights in this part of the world), its Chance Brothers lens and the accompanying plaque.



I am the former Director/Curator of the Yarmouth County Museum where we have a Second Order lens from the Cape Forchu Lighthouse at the end of Yarmouth Harbour. This was initially built in 1839 and was paid for partly by the merchants of St. John (now Saint John), New Brunswick who felt that a lighthouse at the mouth of the Bay of Fundy would be beneficial for their trade (*). The museum's lens was installed in 1908. Sadly, this is a Paris-built lens and not one of the Chance Brothers' lenses. (Being initially from the Black Country - Langley - this has always been a disappointment to me). You can see more of this at http://yarmouthcountymuseum.ca/index.php/museum/permanent-collection/ fresnel-lens (* Editor's note: the huge tidal range on the lower reaches of the River Severn is second only to that in the Bay of Fundy, officially the highest tidal range in the world. Small wonder they wanted a lighthouse there!)

In addition to my job as curator, and a passion for ships, my interest in Chance Brothers comes as a result of growing up only a couple of miles from the Chance Brothers Glassworks until I was eleven when my family moved to Canada. I've been a member of both The Friends of the Black Country Museum and the Birmingham Canals Navigation Society for many years.

Hi Graham,

Here is an image of my great, great grandfather William Sedgley working on the engine at Chance's. He was the night watchman at Chance Glass.



He worked at Chance for 54 years and received the following medal to commemorate his service with the company ...





I have also located an image of great great grandfather William in his uniform. The other image is that of Frank Shaw, son of William and my great grandfather.

(Editor's note: In view of the period these images were taken, the discrepancy in surname may not require too much explanation).

Frank was an engineer and produced gliders at Chance's that dropped the troops in Germany during the First World War - I believe this was the factory's key output at the time? He didn't have to fight as this was a protected profession but he chose to sign up with the Royal Engineers in 1916. We think he signed up in West Bromwich.
