Your announcement will then appear on the Events Guide. Allow sufficient notice and the event may be 'voiced' and broadcast live on air during daytime broadcasting. Depending on the number of events, yours might be broadcast several times; there's no guarantee but it should appear at least once. Meanwhile it stays on the Events Guide listings on the world-wide web until the day itself. And it's all entirely free of charge.
