

One of these was a delightful little cruet set with hallmarked silver lids; thus I set about tracing one similar on eBay to get an idea of a bid price. I was horrified to see virtually the same set for sale at £5.40p. To be honest I wasn't all that surprised, since I have seen sets of three or four classic lead crystal decanters, ignominiously tied together on a rope at auction for less than thirty quid, tops.

So I did a bit of cyber-digging and came up with an array of goodies, the price of which defied belief, including a comprehensive set of delightful glassware going for £21.48. Then, in a recent edition of Country Life (it's all I ever read, friends), I happened across a selection of 32 Edinburgh drinking glasses, some in cased ruby, under the hammer for the princely sum of £12.50. Yep, £12.50.

It is mere coincidence that I have recently undertaken a series of lectures looking at the demise of the glass industry and there on the lengthy list of reasons for the residual price of cut crystal glass, somewhere towards the top alongside 'lack of investment' and 'cheap competition', lies the part-explanation that it simply went out of fashion. 



Hands across the water

On behalf of Stourbridge Glass Museum, BGF Chairman Graham Knowles recently presented a gift of the Seahorse Trophy to Janet Grosvenor. She is Admiral of The Royal Ocean Racing Club which celebrates its 100th year in 2025. The Royal Ocean Racing Club has the biggest membership in the world and the seahorse is their emblem. The plaque on the front reads 'From Stourbridge Glass Museum' and on the back it reads 'The Fifi Trophy', after Graham's boat named Fiona. Graham presented the trophy at Cowes Club House, where he has been a member for many years, during the recent Cowes Regatta week, where he has been racing in the same boat for over half a century.

The intention is for this trophy to be used for their Youth Programme for the most outstanding cadet in the training programme and Graham is arranging for some replicas to be produced which the students can retain. The delightful seahorse, by the way, was made by glass artist Gail Turbutt Glass



One for the future

David Reekie is a renowned glass artist who has been at the forefront of glass sculpture since leaving Stourbridge College of Art in 1970.

He taught for ten years at North Staffs Polytechnic and has travelled the world giving workshops and lectures on lost wax glass casting. His work is held worldwide in many museums including the V&A London.

In 1985 he set up his studio in Norwich and in 2011 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate in Arts by Wolverhampton University. Now in his late 70s he is still keen to express his concerns about humanity through his output.

SGM has pondered proposals to exhibit David's work at some stage and this has been brought to the fore by the latest news that David has recently completed his first portraiture commission for collector Mark Holford.

The idea for the commission came about in 2023 during a summer break in Nice when Mark suggested the idea of a sculpture showing himself and David in conversation as artist and collector.

Back in the UK, David started some preliminary sketches and did a photography session with Mark before commencing work in 2024. He says: 'I used the lost wax casting technique to form the glass figures and recorded the whole process of making the piece from start to finish. It was completed in early 2025 and I was very pleased with the result.'

Mark is delighted and explained: 'While staying with us in Nice, David gave me a pencil portrait of myself. This started the conversation, which became an idea, which became a commission and is now a reality. The result is stunning and celebrates my long and fruitful relationship with David over many years. Long may it continue'.

A Thoughtful Moment Between Artist and Collector now sits proudly in Mark Holford's collection, alongside other pieces by David. Who knows, one afternoon in the not too distant future it may be sitting alongside our collection for a while. Watch this space. More at David Reekie Glass
